## Re: Urge support for law to reduce the use of plastic bags using California as a model

Dear Messrs. Cuomo, Flanagan, Klein, Heastie, Kolb and Ms. Stewart-Cousins:

We write to urge you to enact legislation to address the growing problem of plastic bags in New York State.

The Task Force appointed by Governor Cuomo to create statewide plastic bag ban, after the state overturned the New York City plastic bag fee law in 2016, has further detailed the problem but *failed* to take the essential step of recommending a specific approach.

The Governor said it best upon the creation of the Task Force; "*The costly and negative impact of plastic bags on New York's natural resources is a statewide issue that demands a statewide solution.*" According to the Administration, "residents use 23 billion plastic bags annually. A significant number of these bags make their way into littering the environment, harm wildlife, and are *ever-present* in waterways, along streets and in oceans and lakes. Moreover, these bags do not biodegrade in water – they persist for years. The New York City Department of Sanitation currently estimates that it collects an average of 1,700 tons of plastic bags per week, costing \$12.5 million per year in disposal expenses."

This problem is not unique to New York; it is a global problem. According to a recent report, experts estimate that over eight million metric tons of plastic waste ends up in the world's oceans each year, and is likely to increase dramatically over the next decade unless nations act.

The amount of plastics waste found in the ocean is the equivalent of "five plastic grocery bags filled with plastic for every foot of coastline in the world." Experts estimate that by 2025, the amount of plastic waste entering the oceans would double to the equivalent of 10 bags per foot of coastline. The plastic that ends up in the ocean isn't just unsightly and harmful to aquatic life; it resurfaces in the food chain, including fish and shellfish.

What should be done?-New York State must enact policies that are consistent with those of California which has two major components: (1) a statewide ban on thin plastic bags (under 2.25 mils)—the ones most often distributed by supermarkets (those with handles, not the ones used to wrap foodstuffs); and (2) a minimum 10-cent fee for paper & reusable, thicker plastic bags.

California's experience is most instructive for New York. Like New York, California has a large, diverse population with large urban areas and a substantial coastline. The law has been in effect for over a year, and has been described by the Los Angeles Times, "Californians took in stride the sudden absence of some 13 billion bags that in previous years were handed out at grocery checkout counters and by other retailers of all sorts."

Consumers adjusted easily in their shopping experiences. Again according to the Los Angeles Times, "Plastic bags (both the banned and the legal variety) accounted for 3.1% of the litter collected from the state's beaches during the 2017 Coastal Cleanup Day, down from 7.4% in 2010."

The fear that the bag fees disproportionately impact low-income communities has turned out to be overblown, bag fees have been shown to reduce bag consumption across income levels. California mitigated the potential impact on low income communities by making clear that in intent of the fee was to encourage people to bring their own bags and also by exempting purchases made with WIC vouchers.

We urge you to take immediate action to reduce litter and the fossil fuels that create them, save tax dollars, and protect the environment and wildlife by enacting plastic bag legislation similar to California in 2018. We look forward to your support and to working with you on this important environmental issue.
